Introduction:

Although I'm sure this has been done many times, I had never seen this before, and when I did this, I found it very enlightening.

Below is a list of Jesus' miracles as recorded by the writers of the New Testament of the Bible, listed in what might be the chronological order the miracles were performed. Click on an item below to get a summary about that miracle. The miracles are chronologically arranged according to what some scholars believe they occurred. This list also includes two important miracles that involved Jesus – His virgin birth and the resurrection.

This information is provided in two forms.

The first format is simply a list of the miracles along with maps indicating where the miracles occurred in chronological order according to the list. In some cases, the Gospels provide very accurately what city or other location these events occurred, but in many cases, it must be projected from a previous point or back-tracked from a future point. Often, the writer states upon departing a given, Jesus and his disciples went through "many cities and villages" until another data point is provided.³

Following the numbers of the miracles indicate the path Jesus and His disciples too in their travels throughout Israel as it existed at that time. To assist this "walk-through", several colors are used to indicate phases of these travels.

- a yellow line traces miracles 1 through 6.
- A green line traces miracles 7 through 16
- A light blue line traces miracles 17 through 22
- A light red line traces miracles 23 through 34
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Scripture references and comments are not provided in this section in an effort to keep this section as simple as possible. However, titles are hyperlinked to the Biblical text.

Secondly, following the initial list, is a table with more information in four columns. The 1st column is the same number of the miracle as in the first list. The 2nd column is the Scripture reference. The 3rd column is the text from the referenced passage of the Gospels and the 4th column contains notes or minor comments. Most of these are from the same website, <u>http://aboutbibleprophesy.com</u>, but a few are my own.

In both, the titles of the miracles are hypertext linked to the source of this information, <u>http://aboutbibleprophecy.com</u>. Just click on the title to open the referenced webpage.¹

Additionally, the list and the rows of the matrix in the table are hypertext linked to each other.² Clicking on the numbers of the list or the matrix rows will take you to the other.

All Scripture cited is from the NIV because that is what my primary references used.

The Big Picture

Many of Jesus' miracles were performed in the vicinity of the Sea of Galilee in the cities and locations shown here.

Jesus grew up in Nazareth. His first two recorded miracles were in Cana.

His headquarters during his ministry was in Capernaum where he performed many miracles.

The maps at right and throughout this document trace the locations of the miracles in the chronological order they were performed as believed by many scholars. The majority of Jesus' miracles occurred within a few miles of the Sea of Galilee.

It is intended that when those document is otherwise complete, these maps will be redone to be more easily followed and understood.

Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. "But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." " <i>All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet</i> : "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us"). "When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. But he did not consummate their marriage until she gave birth to a son. 2	John 2:1-11	Changing water into wine: "On the third day a wedding took place at Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to him, "They have no more wine." "Woman, why do you involve me?" Jesus replied. "My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Nearby stood six stone water jars, the kind used by the Jews for ceremonial washing, each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water"; so they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet." When this man heard that Jesus had arrived in Galilee from Judea, he went to him and begged him to come and heal his son, who was close to death. <i>"Unless you people see signs and wonders</i>," Jesus told him, "you will never believe." The royal official said, "Sir, come down before my child dies." "Go," Jesus replied, "your son will live." The man took Jesus at his word and departed. While he was still on the way, his servants met him with the news that his boy was living. When he inquired as to the time when his son got better, they said to him, "Yesterday, at one in the afternoon, the fever left him." Moreover, demons came out of many people, shouting, "You are the Son of God!" But he rebuked them and would not allow them to speak, because they knew he was the Messiah."	To demonstrate that salvation (healing) is an individual matter: laying his hands on each one Jesus will rebuke and silence the demons
7	Luke 5:3-10	Catching a large number of fish "He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little from shore. Then he sat down and taught the people from the boat. "When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into deep water, and let down the nets for a catch." "Simon answered, "Master, we've worked hard all night and haven't caught anything. But because you say so, I will let down the nets." "When they had done so, they caught such a large number of fish that their nets began to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them, and they came and filled both boats so full that they began to sink. "When Simon Peter saw this, he fell at Jesus' knees and said, "Go away from me, Lord; I am a sinful man!" When they came to Jesus, <i>they</i> <i>pleaded earnestly with him, "This man deserves to have you do this, because</i> <i>he loves our nation and has built our synagogue." 10	Matt 9:1-8, Mark 2:1-12, Luke 5:18-26	 Healing a paralyzed man "Some men came carrying a paralyzed man on a mat and tried to take him into the house to lay him before Jesus. When they could not find a way to do this because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and lowered him on his mat through the tiles into the middle of the crowd, right in front of Jesus. "When Jesus saw their faith, he said, "Friend, your sins are forgiven." "The Pharisees and the teachers of the law began thinking to themselves, "Who is this fellow who speaks blasphemy? Who can forgive sins but God alone?" "Jesus knew what they were thinking and asked, "Why are you thinking these things in your hearts? Which is easier: to say, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Get up and walk'? (Note 1) But I want you to know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins." Some of them were looking for a reason to accuse Jesus, so they watched him closely to see if he would heal him on the Sabbath. Jesus said to the man with the shriveled hand, "Stand up in front of everyone." Then Jesus asked them, "Which is lawful on the Sabbath: to do good or to do evil, to save life or to kill?" But they remained silent. He looked around at them in anger and, deeply distressed at their stubborn hearts, said to the man, "Stretch out your hand." He stretched it out, and his hand was completely restored. Then the Pharisees went out and began to plot with the Herodians how they might kill Jesus. (Mark 3:1-6, NIV).	Jesus demonstrates again that the Pharisees do not understand the LAW of Moses. Jesus IS the LAW. In this case, Jesus did not wait to be asked to heal the man. As he approached the town gate, a dead person was being carried out - the only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a large crowd from the town was with her. When the Lord saw her, his heart went out to her and he said, "Don't cry." Then he went up and touched the bier they were carrying him on, and the bearers stood still. He said, "Young man, I say to you, get up!" The dead man sat up and began to talk, and Jesus gave him back to his mother. They were all filled with awe and praised God. 13	Matt 8:23-27, Mark 4:35-41, Luke 8:22-25	Calming the stormy sea Then he got into the boat and his disciples followed him. Suddenly a furious storm came up on the lake, so that the waves swept over the boat. But Jesus was sleeping. The disciples went and woke him, saying, and "Lord, save us! We're going to drown!" He replied, "You of little faith, why are you so afraid?" Then he got up and rebuked the winds and the waves, and it was completely calm. The men were amazed and asked, "What kind of man is this? Even the winds and the waves obey him!" (Matthew 8:23-27, NIV)	Jesus shows his absolute dominion over the forces of nature. He was sleeping, further showing his humanity.

14	Matt 8:28-32, Mark 5:1-13, Luke 8:26-33	 Healing the Gerasene demon-possessed man They went across the lake to the region of the Gerasenes. When Jesus got out of the boat, a man with an impure spirit came from the tombs to meet him. This man lived in the tombs, and no one could bind him anymore, not even with a chain. For he had often been chained hand and foot, but he tore the chains apart and broke the irons on his feet. No one was strong enough to subdue him. Night and day among the tombs and in the hills he would cry out and cut himself with stones. When he saw Jesus from a distance, he ran and fell on his knees in front of him. He shouted at the top of his voice, "What do you want with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? In God's name don't torture me!" For Jesus had said to him, "Come out of this man, you impure spirit!" Then Jesus asked him, "What is your name?" "My name is Legion," he replied, "for we are many." And he begged Jesus again and again not to send them out of the area. A large herd of pigs was feeding on the nearby hillside. The demons begged Jesus, "Send us among the pigs; allow us to go into them." He gave them permission, and the impure spirits came out and went into the pigs. The herd, about two thousand in number, rushed down the steep bank into the lake and were drowned. (Mark 5:1-13, NIV). 	In this occasion, Jesus deals directly with a "Legion" of demons – all by Himself. Incredibly strong, this man with these demons could tear chains apart and BREAK the iron bands. People had given up on trying to contain him. Jesus gave the demons what they wanted, but they got more than they bargained for because they ran down to the lake and drowned themselves. Matt 8 mentions that there was also a second demon- possessed man who was healed during this miracle.
15	Matt 9:20-22, Mark 5:25-34, Luke 8:43-48	 Healing a woman with internal bleeding And a woman was there who had been subject to bleeding for twelve years. She had suffered a great deal under the care of many doctors and had spent all she had, yet instead of getting better she grew worse. When she heard about Jesus, she came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, because she thought, "If I just touch his clothes, I will be healed." Immediately her bleeding stopped and she felt in her body that she was freed from her suffering. At once Jesus realized that power had gone out from him. He turned around in the crowd and asked, "Who touched my clothes?" "You see the people crowding against you," his disciples answered, "and yet you can ask, "Who touched me?" " But Jesus kept looking around to see who had done it. Then the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came and fell at his feet and, trembling with fear, told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has healed you. Go in peace and be freed from your suffering." (Mark 5:25-34, NIV) 	All known medicine and treatment of men failed, but merely touching Jesus in desperate faith completely and instantaneously healed this woman who had seriously suffered for more than 12 years. "Power had gone out from Him"??? This does not mean that Jesus' "power" was diminished as a result. Did Jesus not KNOW who had

16	Matt 9:18-19, 23- 25; Mark 5:22-24, 35-43; Luke 8:41-42, 49- 56	Raising Jairus' daughter Then a man named Jairus, a synagogue leader, came and fell at Jesus' feet, pleading with him to come to his house because his only daughter, a girl of about twelve, was dying. As Jesus was on his way, the crowds almost crushed him. While Jesus was still speaking, someone came from the house of Jairus, the synagogue leader. "Your daughter is dead," he said. "Don't bother the teacher anymore." Hearing this, Jesus said to Jairus, "Don't be afraid; just believe, and she will be healed." When he arrived at the house of Jairus, he did not let anyone go in with him except Peter, John and James, and the child's father and mother. Meanwhile, all the people were wailing and mourning for her. "Stop wailing," Jesus said. "She is not dead but asleep." They laughed at him, knowing that she was dead. But he took her by the hand and said, "My child, get up!" Her spirit returned, and at once she stood up. Then Jesus told them to give her something to eat. Before Jesus arrived at Jairus' house, Jairus was told that his daughter was already dead. Jesus went to his home and brought his daughter back to life.
17	Matt 9:27-31	Healing two blind men As Jesus went on from there, two blind men followed him, calling out, "Have mercy on us, Son of David!" When he had gone indoors, the blind men came to him, and he asked them, "Do you believe that I am able to do this?" "Yes, Lord," they replied. Then he touched their eyes and said, "According to your faith let it be done to you"; and their sight was restored. Jesus warned them sternly, "See that no one knows about this." But they went out and spread the news about him all over that region. (Matt 9:27-31, NIV)	This miracle is not covered in any of the other 3 Gospels or elsewhere (that I could find).

He then dismissed the crowd and went up a mountain by himself to pray. Afterwards, Jesus performed a miracle of walking on water. This accounting in Matthew is the most detailed in comparison to that in Mark and John:
22	Matt 14:34-36; Mark 6:53-56	Healing of many in Gennesaret When they had crossed over, they landed at Gennesaret and anchored there. As soon as they got out of the boat, people recognized Jesus. They ran throughout that whole region and carried the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went-into villages, towns or countryside-they placed the sick in the marketplaces. They begged him to let them touch even the edge of his cloak, and all who touched it were healed. (Mark 6:53-56, NIV)	After Jesus performed the miracle of walking on water, on the Sea of Galilee, he and his disciples anchored their boat on the shore at the town of Gennesaret. The residents there recognized Jesus and went to him to be miraculously healed.
23	Matt 15:21-28, Mark 7:24-30	Healing a demon-possessed girl Leaving that place, Jesus withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon. A Canaanite woman from that vicinity came to him, crying out, "Lord, Son of David, have mercy on me! My daughter is demon-possessed and suffering terribly." Jesus did not answer a word. So his disciples came to him and urged him, "Send her away, for she keeps crying out after us." He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of Israel." The woman came and knelt before him. "Lord, help me!" she said. He replied, "It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs." "Yes it is, Lord," she said. "Even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table." Then Jesus said to her, "Woman, you have great faith! Your request is granted." And her daughter was healed at that moment. (Matt 15:21-28, NIV)	Tyre and Sidon were important, high traffic port cities on the Mediterranean Sea, about 20 miles apart, in Pheonicia, north of Israel.

24	Mark 7:31-37	Healing a deaf man with a speech impediment Then Jesus left the vicinity of Tyre and went through Sidon, down to the Sea of Galilee and into the region of the Decapolis. There some people brought to him a man who was deaf and could hardly talk, and they begged Jesus to place his hand on him. After he took him aside, away from the crowd, Jesus put his fingers into the man's ears. Then he spit and touched the man's tongue. He looked up to heaven and with a deep sigh said to him, "Ephphatha!" (which means "Be opened!"). At this, the man's ears were opened, his tongue was loosened and he began to speak plainly. Jesus commanded them not to tell anyone. But the more he did so, the more they kept talking about it. People were overwhelmed with amazement. "He has done everything well," they said. "He even makes the deaf hear and the mute speak." (Mark 7:31-37, NIV)	After Jesus left the region of Tyre, some people brought to him a man who was deaf and had difficulty speaking. Jesus miraculously healed the man of both ailments.
25	Matt 15:29-39, Mark 8:1-10	Feeding the 4000 men and their families Jesus left there and went along the Sea of Galilee. Then he went up on a mountainside and sat down. Great crowds came to him, bringing the lame, the blind, the crippled, the mute and many others, and laid them at his feet; and he healed them. The people were amazed when they saw the mute speaking, the crippled made well, the lame walking and the blind seeing. And they praised the God of Israel. Jesus called his disciples to him and said, "I have compassion for these people; they have already been with me three days and have nothing to eat. I do not want to send them away hungry, or they may collapse on the way." His disciples answered, "Where could we get enough bread in this remote place to feed such a crowd?" "How many loaves do you have?" Jesus asked. "Seven," they replied, "and a few small fish." He told the crowd to sit down on the ground. Then he took the seven loaves and the fish, and when he had given thanks, he broke them and gave them to the disciples, and they in turn to the people. They all ate and were satisfied. (Matt 15:29-39, NIV)	During a time when Jesus was in the region of Galilee, large crowds of people gathered before him, bringing people who suffered from a variety of ailments, including being mute, invalid or blind. Jesus miraculously healed them. At one point, there was a large crowd of about 4000 men and their families who had nothing to eat. Jesus miraculously fed them. There is a separate miracle in which Jesus fed 5,000 men. [See Miracle # 20.]

26	Mark 8:22-26	Healing a blind man in Bethsaida They came to Bethsaida, and some people brought a blind man and begged Jesus to touch him. He took the blind man by the hand and led him outside the village. When he had spit on the man's eyes and put his hands on him, Jesus asked, "Do you see anything?" He looked up and said, "I see people; they look like trees walking around." Once more Jesus put his hands on the man's eyes. Then his eyes were opened, his sight was restored, and he saw everything clearly. Jesus sent him home, saying, "Don't even go into the village." (Mark 8:22-26, NIV)	The New Testament records more than one miracle when Jesus healed the blind. In John 9:1-41, Jesus mixes saliva with dirt and spreads the mud on the blind person's eyes and he is miraculously able to see. The Gospel of Mark describes another miracle in which Jesus puts saliva on a man's eyes
27	John 9:1-41	Healing a man born blind As he went along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" (Matt 17:14-20, NIV) Catching a fish with a coin in its mouth After Jesus and his disciples arrived in Capernaum, the collectors of the two-drachma temple tax came to Peter and asked, "Doesn't your teacher pay the temple tax?" "Yes, he does," he replied. When Peter came into the house, Jesus was the first to speak. "What do you think, Simon?" he asked. "From whom do the kings of the earth collect duty and taxes-from their own children or from others?" "From others," Peter answered. "Then the children are exempt," Jesus said to him. "But so that we may not cause offense, go to the lake and throw out your line. Take the first fish you catch; open its mouth and you will find a four-drachma coin. Take it and give it to them for my tax and yours." (Matt 17:24-27, NIV) 	During a time when Jesus and Peter were in the town of Capernaum, which is in the region of Galilee in the northern part of the Biblical land of Israel, tax collectors approached Peter and asked for taxes for the Temple. So taking hold of the man, he healed him and sent him on his way. When Jesus arrived, some of the people who were mourning with the sisters questioned whether Jesus, who was able to heal a blind man, could have done something to have prevented Lazarus from dying (John 11:37). When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Many rebuked him and told him to be quiet, but he shouted all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" He approached Jesus to kiss him, but Jesus	On the night that Jesus was betrayed by Judas Iscariot, one of his followers used a sword to cut off the ear of one of the men who had come to arrest Jesus. In 1 Corinthians 15, Paul explains the significance of Jesus' resurrection, that He died for our sins (1 Cor 15:3) and that our faith would be meaningless if there had been no resurrection (1 Cor 15:17. Paul is one of the people who encountered Jesus after the resurrection. Paul traveled more than 10,000 miles by land and by sea, telling people about Jesus,

		"No," they answered. He said, "Throw your net on the right side of the boat and you will find some." When they did, they were unable to haul the net in because of the large number of fish. Then the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" As soon as Simon Peter heard him say, "It is the Lord," he wrapped his outer garment around him (for he had taken it off) and jumped into the water. The other disciples followed in the boat, towing the net full of fish, for they were not far from shore, about a hundred yards. When they landed, they saw a fire of burning coals there with fish on it, and some bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you have just caught." 40	Acts 1:1-11	The ascension of Jesus Christ In my former book, O Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and to teach until the day he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles he had chosen. After his suffering, he showed himself to these men and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God. On one occasion, while he was eating with them, he gave them this command: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." So when they met together, they asked him, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?" He said to them: "It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." After he said this, he was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight. They were looking intently up into the sky as he was going, when suddenly two men dressed in white stood beside them. "Men of Galilee," they said, "why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven." (Acts 1:1-11, NIV)	Jesus ascended into heaven 40 days after he had been resurrected. During those 40 days he appeared to his followers and continued to teach them. The book of Acts was written to a person named Theophilus (Acts 1:1). The name "Theophilus" means "lover of God", "loved by God" or "friend of God." His exact identity is unknown. Some believe he was a wealthy relative of Caesar or, that he was the benefactor who paid for Luke's Doctor Degree; still others that he was a pseudonym for someone who wanted to remain anonymous; or Luke wanted to keep his identity secret because of potential persecution.

What then is the Bottom Line to Jesus' miracles for everyone subject to His name?

John 3:16-21 (ESV)

¹⁶ For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. ¹⁷ For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. ¹⁸ Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son.

¹⁹ <u>This is the verdict</u>: Light has come into the world, but people loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰ Everyone who does evil hates the light, and will not come into the light for fear that their deeds will be exposed. ²¹ But whoever lives by the truth comes into the light, so that it may be seen plainly that what they have done has been done in the sight of God.
